Who We Are:

'Ao'ao O Nā Loko I'a O Maui (Association of the Fishponds of Maui) was formed in 1996 for the purpose of revitalizing the ancient royal Hawaiian fishpond, Kō'ie'ie located at Kalepolepo, Kīhei, in the ahupua'a of Ka'ono'ulu on the island of Maui.

'Aoʻao O Nā Loko Iʻa O Maui is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization whose talented Board is a combination of community leaders, educators, residents, visitors and government officials who are concerned for the future of $K\bar{o}$ ieʻie Loko Iʻa and the perpetuation of the Hawaiian culture.

What We Are Doing:

'Ao'ao O Nā Loko l'a O Maui has dedicated itself to revitalizing Kō'ie'ie Loko l'a for educational, archaeological, cultural and recreational purposes. We feel that this fishpond is a symbol of the Hawaiian culture and history. Therefore, it must be preserved as a monument to Hawaii's past and an icon for the future.

It is a cultural landmark tucked away in the growing community of Kihei, Maui where many are unaware of its significance. 'Ao'ao O Nā Loko l'a O Maui is working to change this. We are working with the community, nearby condominiums and local organizations to bring the historical and cultural life back to a landmark which has been living quietly for too long.

This fishpond was sacred to the ali'i, royal chiefs and chiefesses of Hawai'i. It was repaired and often visited by many ali'i including Kamehameha I, III, IV and V, 'Umi-a-Liloa and Maui's present day Aloha Week royal court, above. As a tribute to its cultural significance and value, Kō'ie'ie Loko I'a is listed on the National and State Registers of Historic Places.

Where We Are Going:

Our goals are ambitious and very possible.....

Goal 1: Obtaining funds and permits

We must raise funds estimating over \$250,000 to support revitalization and education efforts. Also, permits must be obtained from government agencies prior to the start of physically rebuilding Kōʻieʻie Loko Iʻa.

Goal 2: Revitalization

We will begin reconstruction of the pond's structure to resemble the original fishpond as accurately as possible based on information such as surveys, oral histories, literary research and expert consultations.

Goal 3: Education

Our overall goal is education. We envision the fishpond as a teaching tool for Hawai'i's youth, residents and visitors to learn the many aspects of the Hawaiian culture, its values and its historical accomplishments.



Where we're located:

Kō'ie'ie Loko I'a is located adjacent to the office site of 'Ao'ao O Nā Loko I'a O Maui at 726 South Kihei Road, Kihei. Our office is within the Education Center of the Hawaiian Islands Humpback Whale National Marine Sanctuary. Kalepolepo Park and Menehune Shores are also neighboring properties of the fishpond. We invite you to visit and find your own personal reason for saving this historic cultural treasure.
